Day 1: Arrive Aurangabad

Upon arrival at Aurangabad airport, you will be met and transferred to your hotel. The rest of the day is at your leisure.

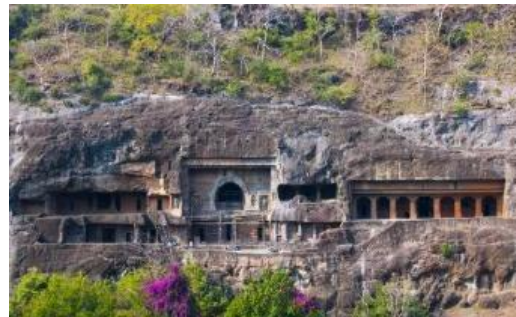
**Destination Information**

Aurangabad - Aurangabad is a city in Maharashtra state in India. The city is a tourism hub, surrounded by many historical monuments, including the Ajanta Caves and Ellora Caves, which are UNESCO World Heritage Sites

Day 2: Explore Ajanta

Meals: B, L

Today, enjoy a full-day excursion to the spectacular Ajanta Caves, located northeast of Aurangabad. Carved into a horseshoe-shaped cliff overlooking the Waghora River, these remarkable Buddhist cave temples date from around 200 BC to 650 AD.

**Destination Information**

Ajanta Caves - The Ajanta Caves are ancient monasteries and worship-halls of different Buddhist traditions carved into a 75-metre (246 ft) wall of rock. The caves include paintings and rock-cut sculptures which are universally regarded as masterpieces of Buddhist religious art and are often described as among the finest surviving examples of ancient Indian art.

Day 3: Explore Ellora

Meals: B, L

This morning, visit the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Ellora Caves, comprising 34 rock-cut monasteries and temples. The highlights of the complex is the awe-inspiring Kailash Temple, an immense monolithic structure carved from a single rock face.

Later this afternoon, transfer to the airport where your arrangements conclude.

**Destination Information**

Ellora Caves - The Ellora Caves are a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the largest rock-cut Hindu temple cave complexes in the world. There are over 100 caves at the site, 34 of which are open to public.

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
